Letter from the President & President-Elect

Fellow CRNAs,

This year has seen both the culmination of hard work from years past, as well as the continued efforts of our awesome Oregon CRNAs. Not only has ORANA been successful within the political arena, we have also made great strides to continue to modernize and update our organization through improved communication and structure.

Despite being promised the contrary by the Oregon Society of Anesthesiologists, this year's short legislative session brought with it yet another AA bill. ORANA once again prevailed against this threat through the efforts of our GRC team and legislative advocates; however, the attack from the other side proved to be the most organized and powerful to date.

The month of February proved to be one of the most important within ORANA's recent history, for Division 52 was approved by the board of nursing. The scope of practice rules contained within the updated document codify modern standards of CRNA care and even include the use of fluoroscopy for non-surgical pain management. All of us owe a great deal of

gratitude toward Christy Cowgill and all of the involved stake holders that started us on this journey so long ago.

Although the aforementioned successes give us something to be proud of, our work is not yet finished. We expect the same if not stronger argument for licensure of AAs during this coming year's long legislative session as well as legislation that seeks to counter the new scope of practice rules found in Division 52. ORANA and AANA leadership have already begun to strategize and work on a defense for both a 2017 AA bill and legislation that seeks to limit an Oregon CRNA's ability to utilize fluoroscopy.

Thus, we call on each and every Oregon CRNA to become as involved as you possibly can. Realize that without your assistance, we could lose the great practice environment within our home state. It has been my pleasure to represent such a strong group of individuals and practitioners and I thank you for the opportunity to do so.

Other great topics include:


- Neuropathic pain management

Spring 2016 GRC Update

ORANA Membership,

Your ORANA GRC team has been busy these last few months and I want to take the opportunity to update on our efforts. Our success is only possible through the hard work and dedication to service that YOU provide to our organization. We continue to be well positioned and have developed strong coalitions with our regulatory body the OSBN, legislators and healthcare policy leaders here in Oregon. However, there continues to be the need and opportunity to assist your GRC team as we will be entering a busy election season

Although before we address our future needs, we need to pause for a moment to appreciate the successes we have achieved so far this year. As I'm certain

you all our aware, In January of this year, your GRC team had to quickly come together to again oppose HB 4108 which would license Anesthesiology Assistance into the state of Oregon. A similar bill was defeated in 2013, and 2015, so legislators were already informed on the issue. ORANA was able to successfully demonstrate the lack of a work force issue, and oppose this bill during

this session. However, of concern was a much more polished and influential presentation put forth by the bill sponsors and testimony presented. We are certainly going to see this issue come forward again in the 2017 session, as the ASA

tread nationwide is to promote licensure of AA's across the country. We will continue to keep you updated as this develops.

In February, at the Oregon Board of Nursing board meeting, language to revise Division 52 of the Nursing Practice Act which outlines the rules governing CRNA practice is Oregon was presented to the board. This was a culmination of work headed by Christy Cowgill over the previous 18 months. Several meetings were held with specific APRN stakeholders and CRNA's in collaboration with the OSBN Rules Advisory Committee (RAC), OSBN policy analysts and OSBN Attorney General to present the draft rules to the board. These rules did not expand upon CRNA scope of practice, but rather modernized our current rules to reflect and codify existing practice. After some discussion, the board voted on the proposed rules and elected to adopt the rules with an effective date of August 1, 2016. Included in these rules, was clarification that CRNA' practice includes both "acute and chronic pain management".

Clearly this issue has become bothersome to some within Oregon. Challenges to CRNA use of fluoroscopy and other imaging devices in practice settings has become a concern. ORANA is aware of these concerns, and is working closely with the OSBN, Board of Medical Imaging, our legal team and AANA to clarify our regulatory language is consistent among all licensing agencies. Again, ORANA will keep you informed.

I want to stress upon our members the need for active involvement. At the annual AANA Mid-Year Assembly, I was fortunate to attending a working meeting with Jeff Kopecky, our lobbyist Fawn Berry, Luis Rivera, the AANA legal team, and several ORANA students to discuss future strategies for addressing continued attacks on our practice in Oregon. Suffice it say, we have been successful through the hard work, dedication to cause and relationships we have built over the years with regulators, legislators and policy analyst's. As we enter into a busy election season, it is critical that we continue to keep our friends close. We will be working with our state lobbyist to identify key races and find CRNA's who live in those congressional districts to hopefully participate in those campaign races. It is through this volunteer work that we continue to position ORANA in the light, so they know who we are and what we do. So I am asking you to take those call, help to participate where you can, and ensure ORANA stays strong.

Finally, ORANA held a meet and greet event on May 14, 2016. This was a great success and 32 CRNA's and students attended. Scott Rigdon, former ORANA Past President who is now practicing in nonsurgical pain management *Continued on next page...*

Nominating Committee

This year your board voted to upgrade the board election voting system by switching to Election Buddy. This new online service will improve our Board election process by ensuring anonymity, increasing security and improving the ease of voting. The goal is to increase participation in our voting and to address areas in need of improvement identified by our AANA State Organizational Review. Here is the timeline for our board election process per our Bylaws.

A) Election Process Timeline

- 1) June 1 Names to be recommended to the Nominating Committee
- 2) **June 15** Nominating Committee presents nominations to the Board with Board approval required one week later
- 3) **July 1** Nominating Committee forwards ballot to members for vote; President may appoint tellers (see (E) below)
- 4) July 15 Deadline for ballots to be returned
- 5) August 1 New officers, Board of Directors announcement to members
- 6) All steps in process may be accomplished by either electronic or traditional mail or a combination of both.

Lessons from Mid-Year Assembly

I recently had the opportunity to attend the AANA Mid-Year Assembly in Washington DC, and learned about proposed legislation that will affect the profession of nurse anesthesia across the country.

For the first few days of the assembly, I joined hundreds of CRNAs to learn about the proposed legislation and how best to present our profession and ourselves when meeting with our legislators. One session that struck me the most focused on advocating for legislation by telling a personal story. This session got me thinking about my own story, and how it could be used to connect with our legislators to protect and advance the practice of nurse anesthesia.

I grew up in a rural community in Missouri. My extended family hails from the Missouri-Arkansas border, where many of them live to this day. Having spent the last decade of my life working in cutting-edge, academic medical centers, I am often struck by the medical disparities I experienced as a child and that my family continues to experience. I knew going into anesthesia school that I wanted to find work in a critical access hospital here in Oregon, and use my training to be a part of the solution to improve access to medical care for people who live in rural communities.

Legislators are currently considering two bills that directly affect CRNAs working in rural practices. From the training at the assembly, I felt that my own story was a great opportunity to personally and meaningfully connect with my legislators. Each time I met with an elected representative, I found that they were truly interested to hear how their work affects the lives of their constituents. By talking about my rural upbringing and my plans to work in

a rural community, they were able to connect their actions to the person in front of them, not just a nameless, faceless hypothetical CRNA.

I learned two very important lessons at Mid-Year Assembly. First and foremost, our legislators are considering measures that affect our work as CRNAs, and because of this they truly want our perspective on these issues. For them to make sound decisions, our legislators absolutely need to hear from us about how their actions will affect lives in the communities they represent. Secondly, as CRNAs we need to share our personal stories. By sharing stories about each of our unique backgrounds, the patients we help, and the communities we serve, our legislators and those we live and work with can better understand and value our profession.

Veterans' Healthcare Issues Focus of Capitol Hill Rally by Nurse Anesthetists

Veterans' access to timely, quality healthcare was the focus of a rally held April 5th on the west lawn of the U.S. Capitol by approximately 500 nurse anesthetists from around the

country including a contingency from ORANA. President Elect Jeff Kopecky, ORANA Federal Political Director David Andrews were joined by three students; Student Board Representative Eugene Dickens and Tina Franck, SRNA, both from OHSU and Hannah Secunda, SRNA. Hannah is planning to relocate here from Charleston, SC.

Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetists (CRNAs) have been outspoken in their support of a plan proposed by the Veterans Health Administration (VHA) to expand veterans' access to healthcare by allowing advanced practice registered nurses (APRNs), including CRNAs, to practice to the full extent of their education and licensure. The policy, recommended by a major Independent Assessment of the VHA as well as by the Institute of Medicine and already in place in America's military and Indian health systems, would help eliminate the dangerous wait times for needed care that America's veterans currently endure.

ORANA was proud to be part of the presentation of the AANA's National Health Leadership Award during the rally, honoring Oregon's own Senator Jeff Merkley (D-OR) and Senator Mike Rounds (R-SD). Merkley and Rounds are co-sponsors of Senate legislation (S. 2279) which expands veterans' access to care by supporting APRN full practice authority in VHA facilities. Both senators spoke at the rally. Senator Merkley and his staff included input from ORANA in crafting the legislation.

ORANA also discussed with legislators and their staff the importance to Oregonians that we restore rural access to nurse anesthesia services and support patient access to quality care through nurse workforce development funding. Finally, as congress addresses a national opioid crisis, ORANA asked that they support and recognize role of CRNAs in pain care and patient safety.
